**A REDWOOD AIREDALE WALK**



**WHEN:** Sunday, June 3, 2018  
10:00am until whenever you please

**WHERE:** Roberts Regional Recreation Area in Oakland. Perched high in the East Bay hills, on a clear day this 87-acre park features spectacular views of the Bay to the west and Mount Diablo to the east. The park offers both paved and unpaved hiking paths among groves of fragrant redwoods, along with grassy playfields and shady picnic areas.

**DIRECTIONS:** From Hwy. 13 southbound, take the Lincoln Ave./Joaquin Miller Rd. exit. Turn left onto Monterey Blvd., then left onto Joaquin Miller Rd. From Hwy. 13 northbound, take the Joaquin Miller Rd. exit and turn right on Joaquin Miller. Follow the road up the hill to Skyline Blvd. and turn left. In about a mile, turn right into the park (\$5 entry fee, plus \$2 per dog) and right toward the swim complex. Pass by the pool and proceed into the large parking area. Go to the end of this lot and look for Airedales.

Dogs must remain on leash. Bring water for your dog and poop bags. Cell contact: Chris Hyde, 831-345-1101. Cell contact may be spotty in park, so plan ahead.

**BYOBB:** Bring your own brown bag lunch. When we get tired of walking, those who would like are invited to join us for a picnic lunch among the redwoods.

## ***Did you know?***

Roberts Regional Recreation Area is an East Bay Regional Park enclosed by the larger Redwood Regional Park. The Roberts area opened in 1953 to honor Thomas J. “Tommy” Roberts, long time civic leader.

Parklands in the Oakland Hills contain the largest remaining stand of coast redwoods found in the East Bay.

While redwood forests typically prefer coastal climates, winds funneled through the Golden Gate air condition the east bay redwoods. The valleys protect from extreme temperatures and high winds; adequate rainfall and summer fog provide refuge.

Logging from 1845-1860 wiped out the first generation trees. Second-growth redwoods helped rebuild San Francisco after the 1906 earthquake. Today’s redwood trees are 100 year old third-growth Sequoias.

Joaquin Miller Road is a prominent thoroughfare in the area. Cincinnatus Heine Miller was better known by his pen name Joaquin Miller. Miller was an American poet and “frontier oddity.” The land of his Oakland Hills home, “Hights,” (sic) is situated in the park named in his memory.
