WHERE: Stanford University – A favorite walk reprises on the spectacular and ever-expanding Stanford campus! Walk among the magnificent buildings and grounds of one of the nation's elite universities and learn about the history of this storied institution.

Meet at 10:00am at the Visitor Center at 295 Galvez St. on campus. Park in the lot to the east of the Visitor Center - free on Saturday.

Walk is rain or shine. Afterward, if the weather is fair, join us for a picnic lunch on campus with our dogs. Bring your own or purchase portable food at the student union. In the event of rain, indoor options are available in the area.

DIRECTIONS: From Hwy. 101 on the Peninsula, exit onto Embarcadero Rd. west. Continue straight; when you cross El Camino Real and enter the campus, Embarcadero becomes Galvez St. Turn left into the Visitor Center, next to the Athletic Shop and Track center.

Did you know?

Leland Stanford Junior University was founded in 1885 by Jane and Amasa Leland Stanford in memory of their only child, Leland Stanford Jr., who had died of typhoid fever at age 15. "The children of California shall be our children."

Leland Stanford was a former California governor and U.S. Senator; he made his fortune as a railroad tycoon. Approximately 40 million dollars was donated to develop the university.

The new university was to be nonsectarian, co-educational, and affordable; to teach the traditional liberal arts, and also technology and engineering; to produce cultured and useful graduates.

Standardbred trotters were bred and raced on the 8,180 acre Palo Alto "Farm." The property was given for the school with the stipulation that none of the land could be sold.

After her husband's death in 1893, Jane Stanford funded and operated the university almost single-handed until her death in 1905. It is believed that she was murdered by strychnine poisoning; the identity of the murderer has never been proved.

Stanford is one of the world's leading research universities, known for its entrepreneurial character.

The average GPA of incoming freshmen is 3.95.

There is no official Stanford mascot. The "Tree" which is a member of the Stanford band, honors El Palo Alto, the coastal Redwood. The Cardinal, Stanford's team name, refers to the vivid red color, not the song bird.

The University motto, "Die Luft der Freiheit weht," translates from the German as "The wind of freedom blows."
