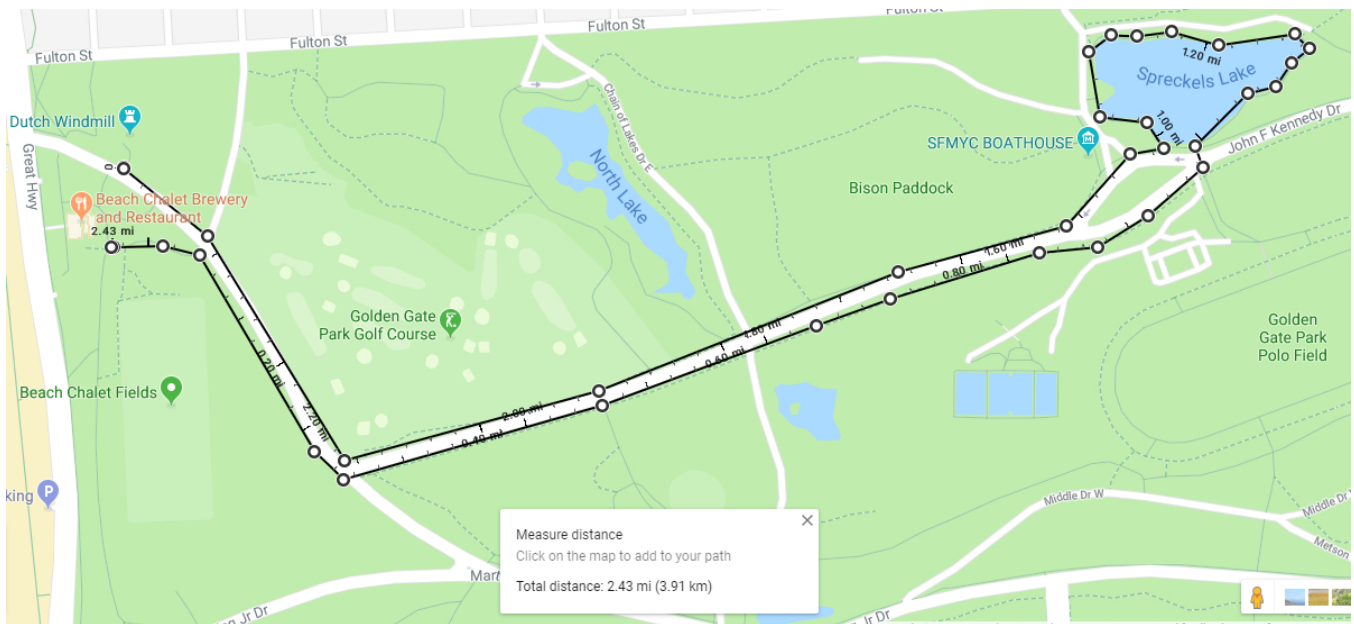
Meet at Dutch Windmill near corner of John F. Kennedy Dr. and Great Hwy. We have reserved tables on patio at Park Chalet, but have to claim them on time, as outdoor seating can be crowded on weekends. If you are late to meet our 10:00 departure, walk along JFK Dr. into the park (see map on p. 2). We will return along JFK after circling Spreckles Lake. Those who want a longer walk may wish to try the off-leash beach after lunch or one of many roads in the park. Leashes required, no flexi-leads, please. Bring water for your dog and poop bags. DIRECTIONS: From the East: Take the Bay Bridge/Hwy 80 West to Octavia Blvd; take Fell St & Lincoln to the Great Hwy. From the South: Take 280 North to CA 35 North/Skyline Blvd/Great Hwy exit. Continue north to parking areas near JFK Dr.

DID YOU KNOW?

Golden Gate Park in San Francisco consists of over 1,000 acres of public land and is the 5th most visited park in the U.S. The Academy of Sciences museum is one of the 10 largest natural history museums in the world.

The park was modeled after New York's Central Park. It is named after nearby Golden Gate Strait, **not** the Golden Gate Bridge, which was erected 67 years later.

The park was carved out of unpromising sand and shore dunes; 50,000 trees had been planted by 1875. Many San Franciscans took refuge in the park following the 1906 earthquake.

The Dutch-style windmills are working structures which pump water throughout the park.

The Beach Chalet opened in 1925 and later expanded with the addition of the Park Chalet (our dog-friendly lunch destination).

Chris Hyde's favorite attraction is the Japanese Tea Garden, where she would go with her grandmother to feed the ducks.
