**DIRECTIONS:** From I-580, exit onto Estudillo Ave. eastbound. At the intersection with Lake Chabot Road stay to the left. Follow Estudillo around a bend to the right; cross the bridge to Chabot Park. Cell phone contact: Chris Hyde, 831-345-1101.

A gate leads directly from the city park into the East Bay Regional Park. We will walk on paved surfaces with some hill and dale! The path has shade, and options of varied distances are available. Dogs not allowed in water due to possible algae contamination.

Leashes required, NO FLEXI-LEADS. Bring poop bags, water for you and your dog. If you walk as far as the marina, refreshments and restrooms are available there before heading back to the starting point.

**BYOBB:** Bring your own brown bag lunch. When we get tired of walking, those who would like are invited to join us for a picnic at the city park.

## Did You Know?

Lake Chabot, formed by the damming of the San Leandro Creek, is a man-made lake covering 317 acres in Alameda County.

The reservoir, completed in 1875, served as a primary source of water for the East Bay into the late 1930s.

Currently, the lake serves as a stand-by emergency water supply.

Approximately 800 Chinese laborers built the dam and blasted two connecting tunnels.

First called San Leandro Reservoir, Lake Chabot was later renamed to honor its principal designer, Anthony Chabot.

Antoine Chabot (1813-1888) became known as the "Water King" for first developing hydraulic mining and later building water operations.

Chabot built water systems for the Bay Area cities of San Francisco, Oakland, San Leandro, San Jose, Vallejo, as well as Portland, Maine and Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

The Chabot Space and Science Center in Oakland opened in 1883 through a Chabot gift of a public telescope and observatory.

Anthony Chabot even cultivated cranberries in Washington state!

Lake Chabot Regional Park is operated by the East Bay Regional Park District under a lease agreement with the East Bay Municipal Utility District.

Lake Chabot was voted #7 on a NATIONAL list of best places to boat and fish in the United States in 2014!
