Did you know?

Sycamore Grove Regional Park is an 847acre open space park in Livermore, CA.

The park is owned and operated by Livermore Area Recreation and Park District Foundation, a community non-profit.

75,000 visitors come to the park each year to hike, bike, ride horses, and walk Airedale Terriers.

One can walk from Sycamore Grove to Mission Park, Fremont.

Sycamore Grove Park is among the few preserved alluvial woodlands left in the East Bay and home to one of the largest stands of native sycamore trees in California.

Many trees in the park are over 100 years old; single trees can live as long as 500 years.

Olivina winery, established in 1881 by Julius Paul Smith, grew grapes, olives, and walnuts on 2,000 acres.

In 1974, the Crohare family sold/donated 800 acres including the Olivina winery building to create Sycamore Grove Park.

Water now flows year-round through the park managed by the Del Valle Dam upstream.

The park experienced major flooding and damage from the 2023 rain events.
